

CONIAS Blog: What made us think last month


India and Pakistan at the Brink of a War: Will new Tensions threaten Regional Stability?



For a truly breathtaking day in late February, <u>India and Pakistan</u>, <u>South Asia's nuclear powers</u>, <u>appeared to head towards another military confrontation</u>, sparked by resumed terrorist violence in the contested Kashmir region. In response to a counterterrorist strike near the Pakistani city of Balakot by the Indian Air Force, the Pakistani military shot down two Indian fighter planes. Although a captured pilot had been released rather quickly by Pakistani authorities, a number of questions remain: What caused this dangerous escalation, were these events even predictable? Which grievances and interests drive the "Kashmir conflict" and why did its parties continue to fail to reconcile and deescalate for decades? With parliamentary elections looming large in India this Spring, what's does this all mean for stability in the region?

For our <u>#ExpertInsight</u> series, we asked <u>Julia Nelles</u>, South Asia specialist here at CONIAS, to provide more information on current events and what – and whom - to watch in the next months.

CONIAS Insight: What you might have missed



On the occasion of the 55th Munich Security Conference in mid-February, we asked our database - comprising at least 1,800 political worldwide: "How are violence and political conflict distributed in the world?". Hence, according to our Security Balance 2018, one in four of 3,800 subnational administrative entities monitored by CONIAS have been affected by political violence at least one time in 2018 - most of them are located in the global South. In some countries, like for instance the Phillippines, some 90 % of the state territory experienced violence driven by political motives. CONIAS founder and CEO, Dr. Nicolas Schwank, concluded amid these numbers that the extent of political violence continues to remain a major impediment for international investments and a key cause of displacement and migration from these areas.


Whether scenario and forecasting techniques can help to manage and mitigate political risk was one of the many questions Nicolas Schwank tackled in his presentation "Szenario-technik und politische Gefahrenanalyse – Wie Sie mit Länderberichten Chancen und Risiken richtig einschätzen" on February 21 in Bonn. One particular scenario, namely the US withdrawal from Syria, had been the topic of the roundtable US Withdrawal Decision: What's Next for Turkey in Syria?, organized by the German Marshall Fund in Brussels, that

Dr. Magdalena Kirchner spoke at on February 26. In an interview with <u>Arab Weekly</u>, she also elaborated on the pressing question of Western Islamic State fighters and their likely return. Her analysis of civil-military relations in Turkey's Erdogan-Era had been published in the latest issue of the Journal Osteuropa "<u>Vergleichende Toxikologie</u>. <u>Herrschaft in Russland und der Türkei</u>".
